# 4. Academic Programs

### [Purpose and Goals of the Program]

In line with our school's philosophy — "Sharing the joy of learning and the fun of teaching while discovering one's individuality and fostering mutual respect" — our programs aim to help learners not only acquire language skills but also deepen their understanding of Japanese society. Students are encouraged to reflect on themselves, take ownership of their future path, and build habits of lifelong learning.

#### [Learning Objectives]

Students will be able to accurately understand and convey main ideas and details of both concrete and abstract topics. They will be able to create clear and detailed texts on a wide range of topics and explain their views from various perspectives.

In addition to acquiring the language ability necessary for their career paths, students will gain a solid foundation for understanding Japanese society and lifelong learning.

Target level: Japanese Language Proficiency equivalent to CEFR B2.

#### [Target Students]

Those aiming for employment in Japan (including students from non-kanji-using countries; kanji instruction is provided).

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Note: Courses are not exclusively focused on kanji study, so students from kanji-using regions or with kanji experience also benefit from balanced instruction in all four skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing) toward achieving B2-level proficiency.

To graduate, students must:

Maintain 70% or higher attendance from enrollment to graduation, and

Receive a final grade of A (80-100%) or B (60-79%) across all subjects in their final term.

# 6. Application Process

#### [Eligibility Requirements]

1. Completion or expected completion of 12+ years of formal education (or equivalent).

2. Must be able to legally enter Japan.

3. Ability (or sponsor's ability) to support tuition and living expenses during the stay.

4. Japanese language ability at A1 level or higher.

5. Over **150 hours of prior Japanese study** or passing a Japanese language test at A1 level or above.

Applicants with a bachelor's degree or higher are exempt from requirement (5). For other criteria such as age, visa history, etc., please consult with us.

#### [Admission Process]

#### 1. Document Screening (Primary Screening)

Submit application form, academic transcripts, and proof of Japanese ability.

#### 2. Interview (Secondary Screening)

Includes a Japanese language evaluation through interview and performance. Will also assess your study motivation and career goals using your native language or English.

#### 3. Document Review

Final screening of identity, academic background, and financial ability.

# 7. Housing Support

We introduce real estate agencies that offer share houses and apartments for international students.

For those interested in homestay, we connect you with a professional agency.

#### 8. Part-Time Work (Permission for Activities Outside Status)

Students on a "Student Visa" are not allowed to work by default.

However, with a Permission for Activities Outside Status, part-time work up to:

28 hours/week during terms, and 40 hours/week during long breaks is allowed.

Work in the adult entertainment or similar industries is prohibited.

Examples: game centers, pachinko parlors, customer-service bars, certain hotel cleaning jobs.

#### 9. Visa Support (Application Proxy System)

To help students live and study in Japan with peace of mind, qualified staff at our school will assist with visa renewals and changes under the "Application Proxy System".

Details are explained at orientation.

Applications for renewal start 3 months before visa expiration.

Note: Visa renewals may not be processed if your attendance, academic performance, or offcampus work violate the conditions for staying in Japan. Always follow guidance from your instructors and advisors.

#### 10. Estimated Living Expenses

#### Monthly living expenses: 120,000

(*This is the average amount spent by our international students and is provided as a general reference.*)

# 11. Job Support System Specialized for International Students

In the **first year**, students focus on improving their Japanese language skills and deepening their understanding of Japanese society. During this time, they also engage in self-reflection to discover and develop their individual strengths and unique characteristics.

From the **second year**, students are guided in developing interpersonal skills and are supported under a comprehensive job support system to ensure they can effectively present themselves during job hunting in Japan.

[Understanding Japan] Beginner Levels 1 & 2

During the first six months after enrollment, students take beginner-level classes focused on "Understanding Japan." This period allows students to steadily build a solid foundation in Japanese through daily life support and academic guidance.

Note: For students enrolling in July or January, classes begin at the A2 level, and the first six months include pre-departure ICT lessons.

[Self-Analysis]Pre-Intermediate

At the pre-intermediate level, the theme is "Self-Analysis." Students explore their areas of strength and fields of interest. They work on creating resumes and listen to stories from alumni currently working in Japan. These experiences help students reflect on what is necessary to pursue employment in Japan.

[Cross-Cultural Understanding]Intermediate 1 & 2

From the intermediate level onward, classes shift toward "Cross-Cultural Understanding," building on the foundation of self-awareness. Students learn to understand differences in thinking, culture, and customs through interaction with others.

Outside of class, students receive support from partnered job support companies to research

industries and companies and clarify their career paths through career counseling. Interview preparation includes speech and pronunciation training for clear communication, and even workshops on how to wear a business suit properly. Students build the confidence needed to approach job hunting with the same mindset and professionalism as Japanese students.

#### [Job Hunting]Intermediate 3 & Upper-Intermediate 1

Based on the Japanese language proficiency and job-hunting fundamentals acquired in the first year, students begin "practical job hunting" from the second year onward. Teachers and staff provide thorough support with résumé reviews, applying for company information sessions, and intensive interview practice, with the goal of securing offers from multiple companies.

#### [Job Preparation]Upper-Intermediate 2

Even after receiving job offers, the school continues to support students with procedures such as changing visa status and relocating. Trusted administrative scriveners and real estate agents are introduced to help students smoothly transition into their new life in Japan with peace of mind.

# 12. Academic Advancement Guidance

At our school, we provide flexible and detailed support for students who initially set out with the goal of finding employment but later decide to pursue further education at a vocational school or university in Japan.

For students wishing to advance to higher education, we offer personalized support through oneon-one interviews to carefully confirm their aspirations and suitability. Our faculty and staff assist each student throughout the entire process — from selecting their preferred school, preparing application documents, and writing essays, to practicing interviews — offering attentive guidance tailored to each individual.

"Returning to learning" is an important step that can broaden future career paths. We respect our students' choices and are committed to helping them make the best decisions for their future through comprehensive academic guidance. Additionally, for students aiming for employment, understanding the content taught at Japanese vocational schools and universities can be a valuable experience. It helps foster smoother communication in Japanese society — by allowing them to relate to the experiences of their Japanese colleagues or seniors who have studied at such institutions, and to compare and reflect on their own knowledge and skills.

Students also participate in academic fairs held at nearby venues, as well as in-school sessions with invited representatives from prospective institutions.
